





As part of the effort to engage Caroline Village, Palmetto Park, and Walnut Oak residents and ensure their needs, preferences, and priorities remain central to the Choice Neighborhoods planning process, Housing Daytona Beach (HDB), the City of Daytona Beach, and Set in Motion conducted a resident survey from March-May 2024. Ten households at Caroline Village, 71 households at Palmetto Park, and 18 households at Walnut Oak completed the 74-question survey for a total of 99 households surveyed across the three target public housing sites and a 70% overall completion rate.
















